A message from our Chairman, Roger Hobbs

Welcome to our Winter Newsletter for 2018.

Firstly I would draw your attention to our AGM this year which is on Thursday 15th February 2018. I am very pleased to let you know that we have what promises to be a very interesting AGM talk by our main speaker Judi Darley from Chichester Harbour Conservancy. You may remember Judi was due to address us last year, but had a bereavement in her family which meant that, understandably, she was not able to attend and talk at our AGM.

The Chichester Harbour Conservancy was set up by Act of Parliament in 1971 as an independent body, with a duty to conserve, maintain and improve the harbour. As well as being the statutory harbour authority, the conservancy manages the area of outstanding natural beauty. I know that many of us use the harbour for various activities and are very interested to hear about the work that they carry out for our benefit so will be looking forward to that talk with great anticipation.

Tony Dignum, Leader of Chichester District Council, has also agreed, once again, to give us his short update on issues that are particularly of interest to us in Summersdale. Tony kindly stepped into the breach at short notice last year to give our keynote AGM talk. This year he will be limited to the usual ten minutes. However I am keen to hear what he says about the latest position with the CDC Local Plan revision. (*see my report on page 4*)

I know from your feedback that our AGM event has proved very popular in the past; not only have we had

some very interesting speakers, but it has also provided a great opportunity for us to meet and chat with members in an informal setting; to review what has happened during the past year and what issues are likely to be on the horizon in the coming year. Annual General Meeting

'We need to restore the glade at Willow Pond. Get the warming rays of the sun down to ground level, so that the bluebell sheen can entrance us again. The path along the north of East Broyle Copse needs widening into a ride. Then we can watch brimstone and orange tip butterflies charge along it in the spring. As for all that invasive non-native laurel, it has to go! Even the holly is too much in some places, making the paths too gloomy in winter; it needs thinning. The sweet chestnuts have been coppiced since at least the early 18th century; that's why it's called the Copse, for Heaven's sake. It's such a shame that we haven't coppiced them for some years now; we must get that going again. And wouldn't it be great to help people with mobility issues to access East Broyle Copse by preparing a gradual path up the slope, using hoggin material? - Not cheap, though'.

'Those are just **some of the comments voiced regularly in recent years at committee meetings** of the Friends of Brandy Hole Copse. I am its chairman. Our spirit has been willing, and also our hearts, because we love the Copse. It's such an amazing place. That Iron Age bank and ditch known as the Chichester Entrenchments. Those soft gravel pits where those naughty smugglers allegedly hid their brandy kegs and other contraband, back in the day. Not to mention the weird assortment of anti-tank roadblocks placed in the ditch in May 1940, when Britain was threatened with invasion. And all that natural world — a veritable cornucopia of flora and fauna... shrubs, mammals, birds, butterflies, insects.

So what's the problem?



Anno Domini, plain and simple. The heart may be strong, but the flesh is weak and getting weaker, especially the legs. **We're all getting older and more tired, rather like the Copse.** At 67 I'm probably the youngest member of the Committee, yet I'm awaiting a hip replacement, not to mention a revision, (replacement), of my damaged right knee replacement. Too much sport down the years, I'm afraid. We all know what we want to do in the Copse, but how to get it done? I've already done the 'what' bit—the easy bit—by drafting a **five-year Management Plan for the Copse, (2017/21), with an accompanying Work Schedule.** I presented it to the Brandy Hole Copse Management Board, and as I'm also its chairman, it was

swiftly approved last January, 2017. No real problem, nothing controversial.

What we needed was fresh blood to bring the Plan to life.

The Copse's ownership is shared between Chichester District Council and two local landowners. Gareth Ryman was an intern Environment Officer at the Council, and in 2016 he mentioned the possibility of **Green Gym involvement in the Copse**, to get things moving. I had never heard of Green Gym, which is organised by TCV, The Conservation Volunteers. **This was to provide us with our fresh blood.** At last, conversation about what was needed could become actual habitat conservation. It took about **six months to acquire funding.** There are quite a few grant-awarding bodies out there. Tesco Bags of Help was worth doing last February. The bid to the WSCC Community Initiative Fund was successful last April. The main grant was from 'Awards for All', which is the younger sibling of the Heritage Lottery Fund, making grants of up to £10,000. It was secured for us by TCV. As for the Community Infrastructure Levy sum, that wasn't to be sneezed at either. Sorry to bore you with all these 'alphabet agencies' but **it makes the point that charitable community groups such as ours can access them, given a fair bit of time and effort.**

To what use would these funds be put, once Green Gym sessions began in the late autumn, 2017?

Recruiting and equipping volunteers to work in the Copse on a regular basis to manage and refresh its habitats by:

- creating some glades and rides,
- assisting with coppicing
- making the Copse more accessible and welcoming to everyone - dogwalkers, children, grandparents, lovers of the natural world.



So that's where we now are, this Spring, each **Tuesday from 11 am to 2 pm.** The TCV van brings the equipment: the billhooks, the handsaws, the loppers, the gloves, the refreshments, the biscuits, even the thigh waders for pond detritus clearance. **We start each session with some exercises,** led by our excellent TCV group leader Colette, who unfairly is young and very active. She gets

us loosened up, which is slightly challenging for me in my state! It's all good, though, because the Copse is such an uplifting place. Tending the bonfire, for the cut scrub, brings out the Boy Scout in me. And I can wield my secateurs with the best of them.



The Copse is so local, so near the centre of Chichester. It's just 15 acres, (6 hectares), of coppiced sweet chestnut, and oak standards. It was **created in the wake of the Great Storm in October 1987**. After the Council had cleared away most of the large fallen trees, a **volunteer group was established in 1988** to manage the Copse, on behalf of the District Council. Its **first Chairman was Jim Ayling, who sadly died last December**. With Jim's determined approach over more than a decade scrub was cleared, new trees planted, hedge fencing laid around the Copse's perimeter on Brandy Hole Lane, flights of steps created, ponds dug, bird and bat boxes places in trees.

In 2001 the Copse became the first designated Local Nature Reserve in the Chichester area. It has since won various awards for its contribution to the local environment.

In many ways it is Jim Ayling's legacy that is being perpetuated by the Green Gym.

We will be placing a new rustic bench in Jim's memory, close to Willow Pond. **2018 will be the Copse's 30th anniversary**. There is still much to be done.

Green Gym is keen to encourage more volunteers, young and old, to join—the more the merrier. It's good for you—for both your physical and mental health—but not too demanding, with plenty of time to stand and chat. **Do come along and sign up**. I am really enjoying it, and seeing the Copse refreshed. As I said at the start, that's been the key—fresh blood!

If you'd also like to become a Friend of the Copse, at the bargain cost of £5 pa, that would be the icing on our cake.

Committee Changes

At the last AGM, I indicated that I would not be standing for re-election in 2018. I have been Chairman of our Residents' Association since the spring of 2013, following Jeremy Hunt's successful election to West Sussex County Council as our representative member for North Chichester. For good reason our constitution says that the Chairmanship should change after three years; I am coming up for five years in the post, so ...

I will not be standing for re-election as Chairman at this year's AGM. Therefore there will be this vacancy on the committee needing to be filled at the February AGM in 2018.

Also, Andrew Birch, our Planning Secretary, will be standing down. *(Trevor Owen, the Assistant Planning Secretary, will be standing for election to replace him and I will be standing for election to replace Trevor).*

Therefore we are asking if any members would be prepared to put their names forward to help with running your association. The current Committee post holders can be viewed in this newsletter; some have specific roles and some are without a direct portfolio; they provide valuable support with various activities as they arise, such as the summer party.

This is not a life sentence; **committee members can come on the committee for a couple of years and then pass it on to someone else**. The committee members are all likeable people and the work involved is a lot of fun. Therefore, please give this some thought and, if you are prepared to put your name forward, please contact me or any of the committee members. If no one comes forward to help out the association, as you know it, will decline and the good work that it does in protecting our Summersdale area may be lost.

Please let me or a committee member know of your interest by end of January so that we can put those names forward at the AGM.

The Past

I said at the time what an honour and privilege it was, and has been, serving you along with a very able committee. We have had some interesting adventures along the way. In the Summer of 2013 we heard that Taylor Wimpey had submitted an appeal against the CDC refusal of planning consent for a housing development on part of the 'daffodil field' site in Lavant and we successfully challenged that. That same summer we had the alterations to the main house in the theatre which resulted in the wonderful, but regrettably short lived, Theatre in the Park, which put on the musical, Barnham, and the play, Neville's Island. In the Autumn Comme Ça closed its doors as a restaurant for the last time. In 2014 Sarah Mansell from the theatre gave us a great talk at our AGM.

Local Plan Issues

In the summer we had the start of the Chichester Local Plan; in the new year the Planning Inspector found this to be sound with the caveat that—following clarity on the waste water and A27 situations - she wanted a revision within the next five years to increase the housing allocation. The revision is progressing though its various stages of consultation and we input into that if the plans directly affect the Summersdale Area. The government formula, now out at consultation, would significantly **increase the housing requirement to 609 houses per annum compared with the 435 dwellings per annum in the current Local Plan.** However, **it is important that we have an up to date Local Plan in place** to stop developers cherry picking sites in an ad hoc manner. For example, two recent CDC **decisions to refuse planning permission for developments have been overturned by planning inspectors at appeal** partly because the inspector concluded that **CDC could no longer demonstrate that it had a five year housing allocation** because of the delays to starting of some of the larger development sites in the Local Plan!

The Local Plan currently out for consultation does not show any sites affecting Summersdale directly, although we have had our fair share of developments with Graylingwell Park, Roussillon Park and White House Farm. **We will need to remain vigilant** during the consultation stage to **ensure that nothing is introduced into the Local Plan that will detrimentally affect the Summersdale area.**

Over-Intensification of Development

Another issue currently of concern is the number of planning applications that are being submitted in Summersdale that propose to develop two, three or even four dwellings on plots where there was originally only one. The SRA looks at each proposal on its merits. Clearly

some developments have greatly improved the general housing stock in our area and that is to be welcomed; but our planning assessment document recognised that **over-intensification of development can be detrimental to the character of the area.** Recently - due to over-intensification - we have objected to developments that have subsequently been withdrawn and replaced with less intensive ones. However, some developments are still being won at appeal. We will **continue to monitor the planning applications closely** and comment where we feel it is appropriate.

Wellington Grange Pedestrian/Cycle Route

A number of members are still disappointed that the off road shared pedestrian cycle route outside Wellington Grange has not been delivered by the developers. Whilst this may seem a relatively short, insignificant section of cycle route, it is actually an important section of a much longer route that runs from North Chichester through to the city centre. We have chased, and will continue to chase, the developer regarding this matter. We have always been assured that it has not been forgotten, but it is disappointing that, to date, nothing has appeared on the ground.

And, of course, the A27....?

Highways England (HE) embarked on its A27 consultation. I think most people agree that the consultation on that subject was very poorly undertaken with leaks of northern routes occurring and then being hurriedly removed with little explanation. It culminated in Chris Grayling, the Secretary of State for Transport, **pulling the scheme from the first tranche of funding.** Since that time SRA representatives **have regularly attended the 'Build A Better A27' consultation meetings** which resulted in consultants being commissioned to come up with an **'innovatory' solution to the A27 by spring next year.** HE and their consultants spent £2m developing solutions to the problem; it seems very optimistic to expect the BABA27 consultants, on a budget of £75k, to come up with an innovatory solution that 'no one had thought of during the previous process'. However, we keep an open mind.

It has been a useful exercise in that we have met Gillian Keegan, our Member of Parliament, who has had meetings on this matter with Highways England and Chris Grayling. Louise Goldsmith, Leader of WSCC, has been instrumental in pulling all this together and deserves our support. At this stage, although nothing has been ruled out, **it does not look as if the northern routes are being considered as realistic options.** To date no options have been discussed; when a solution was tabled at an earlier meeting of the BABA27 the meeting fell apart in acrimony. From what I have seen at the ongoing discussions I cannot think that all parties are ever going to be happy with whatever solution is proposed.

WELCOME AND APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

Chairman Roger Hobbs welcomed all attending, including the Deputy Mayor Cllr Peter Evans, CDC Cllr Simon Lloyd-Williams, CDC & CCC Cllr Tony Dignum, WSCC and CCC Cllr Margaret Evans and CDC & CCC Cllr Len Macey, SRA Committee members Dennis Martin, Vanessa Stern, Mary Quiney, Peter Bickley, Sue Spooner, Trevor Owen, Michael Berry, Alison Stratton-Baldwin and Andrew Birch. and 74 SRA members. Apologies were received from Cllr Derek James and Mrs Ann James, Mike Steel, Betty Purdy and Den & Hen Napier. He reported that the speaker for the evening Judy Darley could not attend but Tony Dignum would speak in her place. Judy will speak at the next AGM.

MINUTES OF THE AGM HELD ON 18 FEBRUARY 2016 Agreed and signed by RH

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT, TREASURER'S REPORT AND ADOPTION OF ACCOUNTS FOR YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2016

RH's overview of topics discussed in the past year, included planning matters within Summersdale and consultations—including the **WSCC Minerals Local Plan** and the **Chichester Conservation Area Appraisal**— monitoring the progress of various planning agreements—including the cycleway from Graylingwell into the City, the off-road section outside Wellington Grange and the crossing into Oaklands Road. SRA continues with tree planting in Summersdale, will contribute to the cost of new seating and a picnic bench along Centurion Way, and is discussing a bus shelter in Lavant Road. The SRA attends race track consultative meetings re the **Goodwood Motor Circuit**. RH said he will not stand for re-election at the 2018 AGM as the constitution of the SRA states that a chairman should only serve for 3 years. He thanked Jeremy Hunt, our WSCC Member for Chichester North, and CDC & City Cllr Tony Dignum for their help in keeping us informed on matters relating to the SRA area.

Treasurer Peter Bickley gave explanation of items contained in the accounts and they were approved.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS AND OTHER COMMITTEE MEMBERS

RH paid tribute to the work of the SRA committee members and reported the sad death of SRA committee member Hannelore Thomas, who lost her battle with cancer last November. The following were re-elected unanimously:

ELECTION OF INDEPENDENT EXAMINER

Carlos Santander was duly elected as independent examiner for SRA.

EXTRA RH asked Deputy Mayor Cllr Peter Evans to present a brief outline of the Council's budget for this year. A reduction of £3.3m is sought on net figures, a total saving of £16.8m. Reserves were good, with £9m to be used. Council tax is to rise by 3.9%, 2% to be used towards social care. Government funding has been reduced by £23.9m. Christopher Beasley spoke about Conservation Volunteers Sussex asking people to vote at local Tesco stores.

GUEST SPEAKER: CDC & CITY CLLR TONY DIGNUM—CHICHESTER VISION

The Vision for Chichester will define how the City changes, grows and improves over the next 20 years. The city has great advantages in terms of location, history, culture and heritage. However, the population will grow and housing must keep up with demand. The city centre has competition from out of town retail areas. Some facilities are lacking in the city, such as a good central hotel. Major changes have happened in the city over the years, and this will continue to happen as the centre evolves. Reducing the number of cars in the city centre was an aim, together with the encouragement of alternative transport modes. There is no further space in the city centre for more large retail units, which would have to be located on the edge of the city. The southern gateway has potential for large scale redevelopment with a mix of leisure and residential and commercial use. Various schemes to contain traffic were discussed, including removal of buses from South Street and West Street. The northern gateway would involve the realignment of the fire station roundabout and the replacement of Metro House. The Eastern gateway would involve two way traffic through the Hornet and the integration of St Pancras with pedestrianisation. The Market car park can be redeveloped and the Western approach could have the creation of a piazza between House of Fraser and the Cathedral. The southern gateway would be the first area to be upgraded, and more street parking was to be discussed. The Vision document has three main themes: the city must be accessible and attractive, it must be a vibrant and growing economy and there should be work opportunities.

OPEN FORUM

Following Tony Dignum's presentation DM asked where the job creation would come from to provide the demand for the several hundred homes proposed for the city. TD said that this was something that the Council would encourage but the private sector would be the main drivers. A member from the floor raised the question of the provision of infrastructure to accommodate the influx of new residents. TD said that the infrastructure would be a necessary part of the planning approval process.

The meeting closed at 9:15pm, when drinks and canapes were served by SRA committee members.

The library are also willing to set people up with the appropriate App to download eBooks, eComics, eMagazines and eAudio from our Digital Library 24/7, if they call in with their laptop or tablet.

'Car Dooring' Mike Steel

I'm sure that those of you who pedal past One Stop, as I do from time to time, are wary of being 'doored' - ie. a driver opening the door of their car or van just as you cycle past. Hundreds of people are injured this way and some killed. But there is something we drivers—(I've also been known to park a car outside OneStop) - can do to help reduce the risk.

It's called The Dutch Reach, it's very simple and it works like this.

Instead of using your door-side hand to open the door, **use the other one**. This makes you twist towards the door and encourages you to **check the mirror** before you slowly open the door -

"reach, swivel, look back, open slowly, and then exit facing traffic", as RosPA puts it.

I have to admit that, after 50 years of driving, it's difficult to change a habit, but worth persevering - it could save a life and it might be mine, or yours!

There is so much of interest; on the Summersdale view, (shown here), you can just make out **the spur railway line from the Chichester - Midhurst line** eastwards to the gravel pits in the 'upsy downies' on what is now the Marchwood estate, ending by the last house at the northern end of Fordwater Road.
